LESSONS AND LITURGY TODAY

Transfiguration Sunday marks the transition from the Christmas and Epiphany Seasons to the Lent and Easter Seasons. Throughout the season of Epiphany, we have heard how Jesus was revealed as the Messiah, the Son of God, in His words and actions. The identity of Jesus as the Son of God is confirmed beyond a doubt as we hear how He was revealed in all His glory on the Mount of Transfiguration. God demonstrated His Love to His disciples by giving them yet more evidence that Jesus was the Son of God. After this event that revealed the Lord's great Glory, Jesus firmly set His sights on Jerusalem and the cross where, in the greatest display of love, He sacrificed His Life to save us all from sin, death, and the grave.

OLD TESTAMENT Exodus 34:29-35

(Moses' face shines with the Glory of God as he proclaims the Commands of the Lord.)

When Moses came down from Mount Sinai with the two tablets of the Testimony in his hands, he was not aware that his face was radiant because he had spoken with the LORD. When Aaron and all the Israelites saw Moses, his face was radiant, and they were afraid to come near him.

But Moses called to them; so Aaron and all the leaders of the community came back to him, and he spoke to them.

Afterward all the Israelites came near him, and he gave them all the commands the LORD had given him on Mount Sinai. When Moses finished speaking to them, he put a veil over his face. But whenever he entered the LORD's Presence to speak with Him,

he removed the veil until he came out. And when he came out and told the Israelites what he had been commanded, they saw that his face was radiant. Then Moses would put the veil back over his face until he went in to speak with the LORD.

EPISTLE

II Corinthians 3:12-18, 4:1-6

(Jesus Christ is the light shining out of the darkness.)

Therefore, since we have such a hope, we are very bold.

We are not like Moses, who would put a veil over his face to keep the Israelites from gazing at it while the radiance was fading away.

But their minds were made dull, for to this day the same veil remains when the old covenant is read.

It has not been removed, because only in Christ is it taken away.

Even to this day when Moses is read, a veil covers their hearts.

But whenever anyone turns to the Lord, the veil is taken away.

Now the Lord is the Spirit, and where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is freedom. And we, who with unveiled faces all reflect the Lord's Glory, are being transformed into His Likeness with ever-increasing glory, which comes from the Lord, Who is the Spirit.

Therefore, since through God's Mercy we have this ministry, we do not lose heart. Rather, we have renounced secret and shameful ways; we do not use deception, nor do we distort the Word of God. On the contrary, by setting forth the truth plainly we commend ourselves to every man's conscience in the Sight of God. And even if our gospel is veiled, it is veiled to those who are perishing. The god of this age has blinded the minds of unbelievers, so that they cannot see the Light of the Gospel of the Glory of Christ, Who is the Image of God. For we do not preach ourselves, but Jesus Christ as Lord, and ourselves as your servants for Jesus' sake. For God, Who said, "Let light shine out of darkness," made His Light shine in our hearts to give

us the light of the knowledge of the Glory of God in the Face of Christ.

Sunday of the Transfiguration A Downwardly Mobile Jesus (Mark 9:2–9)

Glory. We all need a personal measure of it. But it's safe to say that, sooner or later, without Jesus, we would all suffer from a real glory problem—at the expense of one another.

1. A true story about misplaced confidenceand dramatic rescueon a mountain There are three mountains in the Bible that illustrate something about the glory problem and what God has done to rescue us from it.
2. Mountain # 1: A mountain where humanity came face to face with its distance from the true glory of God. The Law of God is good, but by itself it cannot bring abundant lifeonly (1) despair of reaching true glory or (2) striving for human glory and never knowing when a job is ever finished.
3. Mountain # 2: God's true glory, the only glory that really mattersthe approval and love of our Creator has come down to us in the midst of our attention-getting labor, down to us while we are in mid-stride of our mountain-climbing faith, in the person of the Son of God, Jesus Christ.
4. Mountain # 3: God does not wait for us to climb up the mountain of personal achievement. All have fallen short of God's glory. Jesus comes downdown from heaven, down off the mountain top with His disciples to a dark cross where the light of God's true glory and love for us shines.
5. "" says the voice from the cloud (God's voice). Humanity does indeed have a glory problem! But because of the downwardly mobile Jesus, who was crucified for us and now lives forever, we are given to longer strive to achieve human glory but listen for Jesus' Word. What has Jesus said, and what does He continue to say to us that rescues us from our need to climb mountains?
